### FROM THE KITCHEN OF MR. PEPPER:

### FROZEN PINEAPPLEADE

Note that this recipe involves a knife and a blender, so juvenile animals—like pups and kittens and tadpoles—must get an adult's help to make this.

(Unless you're a sea cucumber and can just regrow any limbs you cut off, in which case slice away! Although . . . if you *are* a sea cucumber, you'll find it difficult to operate the blender.)

#### INGREDIENTS:

- 4 limes
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup sugar
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup water

• 3 cups frozen pineapple chunks (If you have fresh pineapple, cut it up, put it in a bag, and place it in the freezer for a few hours. You can also just buy frozen pineapple.)

- 1 cup ice cubes
- Some sort of small seed, like poppy or sesame, if you're serving this drink to birds.

STEPS:

• If you have a grater, use it to grate the skin off two of the limes. Humans call this lime zest. It's optional.

- Roll the limes back and forth on the counter. This makes them release more juice and feels good under your chicken feet.
- Juice the four limes. This should give you about half a cup of juice.
- Place the zest, juice, sugar, and water in the blender, and blend until you no longer see any sugar crystals. (Make sure Esquire isn't napping first, because she does not like to be woken up by blender noise.)
- Add some frozen pineapple and blend, then add more and blend, a little at a time. Do not try to blend it all at once, or you will spend two days cleaning the lair's ceiling.
- Blend in the ice the same way. If the drink looks watery, blend in even more ice. If it looks too thick, blend in more water.
- Pour into cups.
- Optional: Sprinkle small seeds on top before serving. This is how birds prefer their frozen drinks.
