
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Acknowledgments

have collected bits and pieces of information about Black Bart for more than fifty years. In 1990, I provided research, documents, and other help to Bruce Levene, who, with his coauthor, the late William Collins, wrote the first biography of the noted highwayman, entitled *Black Bart: The True Story of the West's Most Famous Stagecoach Robber*, published in 1992. In the next few years, two more biographies appeared: the late George Hoeper's *Black Bart: Boulevardier Bandit* (1995) and Laika Dajani's *Black Bart: Elusive Highwayman-Poet* (1996). Each book provided new information about Charley Boles's mysterious life.

With the advent of online genealogical data banks, digital newspapers, and other historical records, I was able to locate a great deal of additional source material that shed new light on Black Bart and his career. But this book could not have been written without the groundbreaking work contained in the three volumes mentioned above. I owe a deep debt of gratitude to each of these authors, and especially to Bruce Levene, who was kind enough to provide me with many of the research materi-

als he used in writing his 1992 book. This volume is therefore dedicated to Bruce Levene with many thanks for his unselfish assistance.

I also owe a great debt to the wonderful staff of the Wells Fargo History Museum in San Francisco, who first welcomed me as a teenager in the late 1960s and provided documents and encouragement to a young aficionado of the Old West. Irene Simpson Neasham (1916-2006) was its director for three decades. She and her assistants, Merrilee Gwerder Dowty and the late Elaine Gilleran, helped me more times than I can recall. Many thanks are also due to my old friend, the late Dr. Robert J. Chandler, Senior Research Historian for Wells Fargo Bank from 1978 to 2010. Bob was always there to track down an obscure document or answer my never-ending questions. Thanks also to Marc C. Reed, who researched Black Bart more than thirty years ago. nealogical work and uncovered the family history of Charles E. Boles in Norfolk, England. The late Dick Reames, great-grandson of Charles Boles, was kind enough to let me interview him in 1993 and to acquire from him a collection of original letters written by Boles to his family. Those letters are quoted in this book. Peter Pike Jr. graciously shared with me information, photographs, and two books he has produced about his great-grandfather, Jacob Pike, who was Black Bart's friend in San Francisco.

The late Lorraine Kennedy of the Calaveras County Museum in San Andreas assisted me many times over the years. I am grateful to the helpful staffs of the California State Archives in Sacramento, the California State Library in San Francisco, and the Bancroft Library at the University of California, Berkeley. Timber Gulch, the correct site of the holdup, should not be confused with Timber Cove, which is located two miles north of Fort Ross.

Most of the family members, including John and Leonard, spelled their surname "Bowles." Charles used the "Bowles" spelling until the 1850s, after

which he consistently signed his name "Boles." For sake of consistency and to avoid confusion, the name is spelled "Boles" in the narrative. Some recent accounts claim Charles's middle name was Earl, but there is no proof, only speculation based on the fact that one of his nephews was named Earl.
